BASIC INFORMATION

The Advanced Kingdom School of Ministry (AKSM) is a 501(c)3 educational ministry affiliated with the Logos Global Network and Aidan University. As such, AKSM is accredited to grant undergraduate, graduate, and postgraduate degrees to qualifying students and provide training on a certificate basis for those not seeking academic standing.

VISION & MISSION

The vision of the Advanced Kingdom School of Ministry is to prepare fully devoted disciples of Jesus Christ for their inherent ministry to both the body of Christ and those outside the body of Christ.

The Advanced Kingdom School of Ministry will accomplish this vision by encouraging all members of Christ's body, no matter their religious affiliation, to understand that the entire ministry of the body of Christ is built on all its members and not just a few. Further, we will provide teaching and training in the scriptures that go beyond simple understanding but transform each student to walk as Jesus walked and thus minister as Jesus ministered. Finally, we will emphasize the power of living and walking in the Holy Spirit in devotion to the Lord and one another as the only way to live the life of Jesus and accomplish the Christian mission in this age. All courses will be based on moving each student into the reality of "becoming," not just learning.

From an academic perspective, the Advanced Kingdom School of Ministry is affiliated with Aidan University. Aidan University is a higher education institution offering comprehensive online and nonresident programs to provide multi-track training for 21st-century Christian service while remaining committed to the time-honored traditions of biblical orthodoxy.

Aidan provides a unique opportunity for students to prepare themselves academically, professionally, and spiritually to serve God by holding to a biblical philosophy of education and being a servant to the local church and individual students. Aidan's leadership, faculty, and staff are educators, administrators, and practitioners whose experiences and dedication nurture a rich combination of academics, community, and a commitment to their students and the Kingdom of God.

Aidan University awards all degrees earned through AKSM. Aidan University is a registered degree-granting institution with the Florida Commission for Independent Education. As such, it does not hold regional or national accreditation, nor is it considered a Title 1 school by the Federal Department of Education. EDUCATIONAL PHILOSOPHY

The Advanced Kingdom School of Ministry degree and non-degree programs are designed to be practical and academic, preparing people for ministry and service in fulfilling their call as fully devoted disciples of Jesus. Our primary goal is to provide our students with a faith-based education and training that builds a solid foundation for Christian ministry, which becomes a regular part of their lives rather than a vocation. However, each student will also be able to use the abilities developed and degrees earned at AKSM on a vocational basis.

In Hebrew culture, the teacher only teaches if the student has learned. All learning and teaching are ultimately found in the fear of the Lord (Psalms 119:38). Our educational goal is not imparting facts but changing lives. For the Hebrews, knowledge (*yadah*) involves personal encounters and responses to God's revelation. In the AKSM learning method, we return to the Hebraic concept of education, including this personal encounter and revelation. As such, our instructors take on a pastoral ministry posture with each student in their class. The classroom and practicums become places of vigorous discussion and sharing of real-life experiences. It is a place where we meet God and share in the life experiences of others. It is a place of community. Time spent in the classroom is where we are confronted with and respond to truth. It is not separated from life but is a part of our lives. AKSM is a place to become, not simply learn.

STATEMENT OF FAITH

We believe the Bible is the inerrant, inspired Word of the living God. The Bible is the final authority on all matters of life, faith, and practice.

We believe that there is one God, eternally existent in three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

We believe in the deity of our Lord Jesus Christ, in the virgin birth, in His sinless life, in His miracles, in His vicarious and atoning death through His shed blood, in His bodily resurrection, in His ascension to the right hand of the Father and in His personal return in power and glory to judge the living and the dead.

We believe that salvation is an act of God's saving grace by the work of the Holy Spirit in regenerating and converting the hearts of men by His free gift of repentant active faith.

We believe in the personal return of Jesus Christ, the eternal damnation in a literal hell for the wicked, and everlasting life with the living God for the righteous.

We believe that every area of life is to be subject to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. We adhere to a world and life view that seeks to make the Lord Jesus Christ preeminent in all things.

Practicum: A minimum of 3 hours per week, per term, in direct Christian ministry focused on spiritual growth in small community, a weekly report, and a written assignment are required for undergraduate students. A minimum of 6 hours per week during two semesters in direct Christian ministry focused on spiritual growth in small community, a weekly report, 250 pages of reading, and a written assignment are required for graduate students. This graduate/postgraduate requirement may be split over two terms with permission from the instructor.)

The First Step in Your AKSM Adventure

The Foundation Series, a prerequisite for all degree students at the Advanced Kingdom School of Ministry, is a transformative journey into the reality of those words. Developed by our Co-President



and Dean, Dr. Jim Warren, it is designed to help you understand and embody the principles of the “radical countercultural insurgent kingdom lifestyle.” This comprehensive series spans four thirteen-week terms, including eight courses and four practicums, allowing you to grow and evolve in your faith and inherent ministry as a disciple of Jesus.

Envision the privilege of studying under the guidance of Dr. Jim, a man who has not only ministered through numerous distinctive associations for over fifty years but has also experienced God's transforming grace firsthand. This unique opportunity to learn and grow through the wisdom of such a seasoned follower of Jesus is what sets our program apart. Here are just a few of the comprehensive subjects you will encounter in this transformative series:

FIRST SEMESTER COURSES:

- THE161 Christian Foundations “Introduction to AKSM, Christian Life, and Ministry”
 - Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
 - Course Overview: This course is an orientation to AKSM and an introduction to courses covering Christian life and Christian ministry principles.
- ECM101 Evangelism “The Radical Kingdom Gospel: *Its Biblical Roots, Presentation, & Radical Response*”
 - Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
 - Course Overview: Looking at the scriptures from a narrative point of view and the original intent of those to whom and through whom the scriptures came (Biblical Theology), this course will show how the entire thread of the Old and New Covenants is the kingdom of God, bringing humankind back into God’s original design. It will also focus on how this “Kingdom Gospel” was presented by the first-century church and the biblical response expectation from the New Covenant. As you study this course, you will scratch your head as you see scripture from a completely different angle, and then . . . well, that’s when the light bulb goes on. “Maybe my response to the gospel differed from the expected biblical response?”

SECOND SEMESTER COURSES:

- NTS110(A) Gospels: Life of Christ “The Life and Ministry of Jesus, the Christ, Part I”
 - Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
 - Course Overview: This chronological study will be informative, inspirational, and practical. It will relate the parallel accounts in the four Gospels and divide Christ's life and ministry into generally accepted periods. Through proper study and research, the student will thoroughly understand Jesus’ life and ministry in the power of the Holy Spirit. What did Jesus's life look like when seen through the eyes of those who walked with Him? Learning to “read out” of the scriptures rather than “into the scriptures” will open up the gospels’ account of Jesus' life in a new, unique, and life-transforming way. This course also provides practical teaching experience. But hey, we can’t give everything away in the catalog. You’re going to love this intense but fulfilling experience.
- PTH202 Discipleship “Invested Ministry: *Moving from a Message/Event-Driven Ministry Model into the Attitude of Jesus*”



- Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
- Course Overview: A view of ministry, lost to most of the twenty-first-century church, will be uncovered from Scripture along with its impact on how the church's mission should be carried out in every century. Many personal examples of how this approach affected people as the instructor moved into this first-century method of Christian life and ministry will be used as illustrations. Is ministry what we do to and for people and what we say to them, or, at its core, something more? Learning the invested method of disciple-making may turn your world inside out and upside down.

THIRD SEMESTER COURSES:

- NTS110(B) Gospels: Life of Christ "The Life and Ministry of Jesus, the Christ, Part II"
 - Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
 - Course Overview: A continuation of the second-semester course's purpose and objectives
- SYS322 Theology of Prayer "Communing with the Trinity: *A Doctrine Experienced in Reality*"
 - Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
 - Course Overview: What does it mean to be one with the Father and the Son as they are one with one another? Is the Trinity a doctrine to learn or Persons to live in relationship with? How does one live in such a relationship realistically, and how does this relate to Christian life and ministry? These and other questions will be delved into as the instructor takes you into a conscious recognition of the spiritual/mystical reality of biblical Christianity. Is prayer just talking to God, or is it something more? Dr. Jim will walk you through the process that enabled him to learn to commune with the persons of the Trinity in your times of solitude and everyday life.

FOURTH SEMESTER COURSES:

- THE242 New Testament Ministries "Cultivating Communities of Communion: *Bringing the First Century Church to Twenty-First Century America*"
 - Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
 - Course Overview: Is the church we see in America and the rest of the Western world the church Jesus had in mind when he said he would build his church? Can we expect the teachings, commands, and examples of the New Covenant to be lived out in a modern society? What would it take for this to happen if this is what God intended? These questions will be answered as the course leads you to understand the importance of the ekklesia as small, intimate communities of communion. What would happen if we dared allow the Holy Spirit to cultivate our lives together into the communities of communion the first-century church realized? What would ministry really look like if we became what they were and lived as they lived?
- NTS340 Johnine Epistles
 - Instructor: Rev. Jim Warren, Ph.D.
 - Course Overview: John's epistles are studied, carefully referring to the unique theological nuances of the Apostle John. Instructions aimed at the individual believer and the general



church are given specific attention to enhancing spiritual growth and a clear understanding of the biblical concept of Christian living. Are you tired of the excuses that hold you back from living the life commanded by the New Covenant? (Commanded by the New Covenant? Is that a new concept for you?) When you journey through the Epistles of John with Dr. Jim, you'll have the opportunity to experience radical repentance intertwined with active faith-producing obedience. The choice is yours, but the potential for personal growth is immense.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS OF AKSM ASSOCIATES

Standard of Conduct:

- Because of the biblical demands of discipleship, all persons associated with AKSM are expected to maintain the highest standards of conviction and conduct. These standards strengthen the life and testimony of the school and each individual.
- Board members, administration, faculty, staff, and students are responsible for demonstrating a lifestyle consistent with the character of God. They are expected to be men and women of high moral character. This includes their sexual conduct, which is expected to be consistent with the standards of Scripture. This most elevated standard of conduct includes abstaining from any pattern of addiction and homosexual, premarital, and extramarital sexual behavior. (1 Thessalonians 5:22 (LSV), "Abstain from all appearance of evil.")
- Moreover, interactions between students, faculty, and staff are expected to be conducted with respect and decorum, including comments posted in any academic forum of the AKSM Online Classroom. Individuals are free to discuss topics and disagree with one another but must respect others' opinions. Ad hominem attacks, vulgar comments, or inappropriate language will result in academic consequences.

INSTRUCTOR REQUIREMENTS

Background Requirements:

- All instructors must be fully devoted disciples of Jesus Christ, show evidence of growing faith, be persons of proven Christian character, and be active local congregation members.
- Must accept the Apostles Creed as a joint consensual base of Christian doctrine and the ASKM Statement of Faith.
- All instructors must have at least one degree higher than the degree level they are teaching and/or have significant documented competencies in areas of instruction.
- All instructors must have at least five (5) years of direct ministry leadership experience.
- All instructors must see themselves in a pastoral role to each student, serving as instruments of transformation in their lives. Teaching information is inadequate for preparing disciples of Jesus for their inherent ministries. Students must be encouraged to internalize truth, not just comprehend, defend, and implement truth.



Teaching Requirements:

- Each instructor is responsible for the content of the course they teach. However, this content must be approved by the Dean of AKSM and Aidan University.
- Each instructor will prepare eighteen hours of lessons for each course taught and deliver them from an honest heart in a way that holds students' attention and is transformational.
- Each instructor must have a thirty to forty-five-minute mentoring meeting with each student every week for each class in which the student is enrolled. This may be in person or by video conferencing.
- Each instructor must grade all assignments and have grades available for each student within two weeks of the date final assignments are due for their course.

STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

Background Requirements:

- All students must be fully devoted disciples of Jesus Christ, show evidence of growing faith, be persons of proven Christian character, and be active local congregation members.
- Must desire to reach greater maturity in Him by living in complete Spirit-empowered obedience to His will to the best of their ability.
- Must see the sole calling of every fully devoted disciple of Jesus as minister to each other and those who are not in Him.
- Must seek transformation from each truth learned rather than the accumulation of knowledge
- Must accept the Apostles Creed as a common consensual base of Christian doctrine and the ASKM Statement of Faith.
- All degree students must have a high school diploma or its equivalency.

General Class Requirements:

- Each student assigned to participate in person or as an online student must attend all classes required for their course. If they cannot be present at class time, they must watch the recorded video of the class. Only six teaching hours of the live online class can be missed per semester course.
- Each student must actively participate in the discussion portion of each class, whether in person or online
- Each student must participate in the thirty to forty-five-minute mentoring session (in person or online) with their instructor weekly as scheduled. Rescheduling is frowned upon but must be done 48 hours before the planned mentoring session.
- Each student is required to know the course requirements and deadlines for each course in which they enroll.
- Each online student is required to have their own computer, camera, microphone, and WIFI access.
- All students are required to purchase a professional level of Grammarly for use in written assignments.
- Academic Honesty: The Word of God is a lamp unto our feet and a light unto our path, and we are to confirm it by keeping His righteous ordinances (Psalms 119:105-106). It is assumed that academic honesty will prevail.
- Plagiarism: Merriam-Webster's College Dictionary defines plagiarism as "to steal and pass off (the ideas or words of another) as one's own: use (another's production) without crediting the source." AKSM and Aidan University require all of the work submitted by students to be the result of their own writing



efforts and creative processes. We encourage you to use all information available to support your work; however, you must clearly identify sources through proper MLA citation. Thus, plagiarism, in any form, is prohibited, and work containing plagiarized materials will be downgraded and returned for resubmission. The Dean of AKSM and Aidan University are notified whenever a student submits work containing plagiarized materials. Continued instances of plagiarism will result in academic probation and may lead to other disciplinary measures.

- The use of AI for the development of written assignments is prohibited. It may be used to develop sources for research but cannot, under any circumstance, be annotated as the source or used to write any assignment or part of an assignment. However, its use (Grammarly) for grammatical correction is required and is encouraged to be used for sentence structure.
- It is essential that each student sets a sound, disciplined schedule. Don't neglect your prayer and family life, even if it means extending your studies over a longer period. Keep a balance between your studies, ministry, and family.

STUDENT CLASSIFICATION

All students will be classified in one of the following ways:

- **Audit Student:** These students attend classes online to gain the knowledge being taught. They are not required to do the reading, participate in class discussions, or do any written assignments. Practicums and the instructor's time are not necessary or available to these students.
- **Certificate Students:** These are students who take the courses, either in person or online. They are expected to do all reading assignments, including reading journals, but are not required to do other written assignments. The instructor will not grade, review, or mentor them. These students will receive a certificate for each class they complete and are eligible for continuing education hours.
- **Degree Students:** Academic students have successfully enrolled in AKSM and Aidan University and seek academic credit for their work. They are fully responsible for attending all online classes, doing all reading and writing assignments for each course in which they enroll, and completing all other responsibilities assigned by the institution, the dean, or their instructor. All graduate/postgraduate students must take a proctored Basic Bible Competency Examination. Academic students will be seeking one of three degrees:
 - **Associates in Applied Theology/Christian Ministry**
 - Must successfully complete 60 credit hours of undergraduate studies.
 - This may include up to 12 credit hours for successfully completing the Basic Bible Competency Examination.
 - All students must complete a three-credit hours practicum course each semester enrolled, which includes a minimum of 3 hours per week of directly supervised ministry. These hours will be counted toward the 60 credit hours required for an Associate's Degree.
 - **Bachelor of Arts in Applied Theology/Christian Ministry**
 - Must successfully complete 120 credit hours of undergraduate studies.
 - This may include up to 12 credit hours for successfully completing the Basic Bible Competency Examination if it was not used toward credits in obtaining an Associate Degree.



- All undergraduate students must complete a three-credit hours practicum course each semester enrolled, which includes a minimum of 3 hours per week of directly supervised ministry. These hours will be counted toward the 120 credit hours required for a Bachelor's Degree.
 - Master of Arts in Applied Theology/Christian Ministry
 - Must successfully complete at least 66 credit hours of graduate studies.
 - These courses may include undergraduate-level courses with extended reading and written assignments.
 - Graduate students must complete two 3-credit hour graduate practicum courses, which include at least 6 hours of directly supervised ministry each week of the course.
 - All graduate students must write a Master's Thesis as outlined by Aiden University. This will be considered a 6-credit-hour course and count toward the minimum 36 credit hours needed to graduate.
 - Doctor of Philosophy/Christian Ministry
 - Must successfully complete 36 credit hours of postgraduate studies.
 - All doctoral candidates must write a dissertation as outlined by Aiden University. This will be considered a 9-credit-hour course and count toward the 66 credit hours needed to graduate.
 - Doctoral students must complete two 3-credit hour graduate practicum courses, which include at least 6 hours of directly supervised ministry each week of the course.
 - Under particular circumstances and expectations, some students may be considered for a Doctor of Theology degree.
- Independent Study Degree Students: Some degree students may be admitted as independent study students under particular circumstances. The power of live classes is suggested for all students. However, independent study students will pay the same tuition and fees as regular students and meet all other requirements, including but not limited to books and a professional-level subscription to Grammarly. They will be required to meet the same high standards of online classroom academics. They will be given a mentor for each class, usually the current instructor, and pay an additional \$100.00 per course Mentor Fee.

Authorized Withdrawal—A student who wishes to withdraw voluntarily during a semester must satisfy all financial obligations before withdrawal. Students who fail to meet financial obligations will not receive academic transcripts.

Grades of WP or WF shall be placed on the student’s transcript for the courses in which the student was enrolled based on their course grades at the time of withdrawal.

TUITION

Types of students: Audit, Certificate, Undergraduate (Associate/Bachelor), and Graduate

Undergraduate and Graduate students will be considered full-time or part-time.

Full-Time = 9-12 Credit Hours per Term (Includes the 3 Credit Hour Practicum)

Part-Time = Less than 12 Credit Hours per Semester

All Students will register as participating in the online courses.

Postgraduate Tuition per Credit Hour: \$145

Associates (and Bachelors if not already counted toward their Associate degree) can receive up to 12 credit hours toward their degree by taking the Basic Bible Competency Examination. The fee for this exam is \$100.00, and the tuition for the twelve credit hours is \$30 per credit hour (1/3 of the regular tuition).

All students must pay all tuition and fees at the beginning of each term unless other financial arrangements have been made with the AKSM Dean.

Check with the AKSM Dean to see if scholarships or other financial help is available.

Tuition is non-refundable after the first week of each term.
